
Nomenclature & Notation Guide for RACKS AND TABLES

This guide does not include the additional instruments used in Movements #2 and #3, such as 26 Japanese Rin and 18 Bronze Burma Bells (*Kyeezees*). Percussion 1 also plays Vibraphone; Percussion 2 also plays the lower octave of Crotales (C to C); Percussion 3 also plays Glockenspiel; Percussion 4 also plays the upper octave of Crotales (C# to C). Please see front matter about preferred mallets and beaters, many of which are also notated in the score. Please note that 12 additional crotales are needed for the Rin table.

- All notes on Racks are spelled with sharps, and all notes on Tables are spelled as naturals.
- Instruments on the Racks and Tables are positioned in a keyboard-like layout.
- This nomenclature allied to the arrangement of instruments facilitates the very fast interchanges between instruments.

18 BRONZE BURMA BELLS (Kyeezees) AND 26 JAPANESE RIN

This guide does not include the additional instruments which are located on the Racks and Tables. Percussion 1 also plays Vibraphone; Percussion 2 also plays the lower octave of Crotales (C to C); Percussion 3 also plays Glockenspiel; Percussion 4 also plays the upper octave of Crotales (C# to C). Please see front matter about preferred mallets and beaters, many of which are also notated in the score.

On the full score, the exact pitches of the Burmese Bells are notated. Only in the soloists' parts is the nomenclature simplified. The Burmese Bells are assigned spaces on the staff from low to high. Likewise, the Burmese Bells are hung on racks from lowest to highest pitch. This nomenclature – allied to the arrangement of instruments – facilitates the very fast interchanges between instruments.
